

The Lombok Craft Project: The Lombok Craft Project has been working with the women potters of Lombok since 1988. The aim of the Project are to improve the standard of living of women potters and their families in the three Project village through technical, marketing and community development programs such as literacy, clean water, education, sanitation, health and scholarship. The Lombok Craft Project is part of the New Zealand Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade's Development Cooperation program in Indonesia. This is a bilateral project with the Republic of Indonesia's Department of Trade and Industry.

The Yayasan (Foundation) is founded under the royal patronage of her Majesty Tuanku NurZahirah, the reigning Raja Permaisuri Agong of Malaysia. A key differentiator between YTNZ and other foundations is that it believes in empowering people through trade, not aid.




